Authority to Inspect

The Tusla Early Years Inspectorate carries out inspections of Early Years Services under Section 58(J) of the Child Care Act 1991 (as inserted by Section 92 of the Child and Family Agency Act 2013).

Description of service

'Kidz@Play Playschool and Afterschool' was established in 2004 and moved to its current premises in 2017.

The childcare service provides full day care, part-time and sessional care and education to pre-school children aged 2 -6 years of age.

The service operates from 7:30am – 18:00 hours Monday to Friday.

The Early Years' Service is located in a purpose-built premises in a residential development on the outskirts of Maynooth. There are three care rooms, a sensory room, sanitary and nappy changing facilities, a large secured outdoor area and parking available

Staffing

There were thirteen adults present on the day of inspection; these included the registered provider, a student on placement, and the cook for the service. Eleven adults were working directly with the children including a student on placement. The registered provider was supernumerary and provided additional support where needed as well as managing the oversight of the service.

All adults working directly with the children held a major award in Early Childhood Care & Education on the National Framework of Qualifications.

Methodology

Tusla's Early Years Inspectorate is the independent statutory regulator of early years services in Ireland. The Child Care Act 1991 (Early Years Services) Regulations 2016 define the duty of a registered provider to ensure the safety and well-being of children and to comply with these regulations. This Act also gives Tusla the authority to assess compliance with the regulations. The purpose of regulation in relation to early years services is to ensure that the care, safety, and well-being of children attending such services is upheld. Inspections of early years services are planned based on the following:

- Previous inspection history
- Any information received in relation to the service

The findings on inspection are based on:

- Information obtained through examination of documentation
- Direct observation
- Discussion with relevant staff

This inspection was unannounced and focused on the area of governance and safety.

Inspection findings are documented in the inspection report which is first issued in draft format to the service with an opportunity to respond to any findings. Where statutory requirements are identified as not being met, the registered provider must demonstrate how they have rectified the non-compliance and will prevent any non-compliance from re occurring. The Corrective Action and Preventive Action plan (CAPA) will be used to inform decisions about compliance with regulatory requirements. Where the registered provider fails to meet the statutory requirements an escalation process may be commenced.

The inspectorate reserves the right to edit responses received for reasons including clarity, completeness and compliance with administrative and legal processes.

The contents of the report are compiled by the inspectorate body.

Part III – Management and Staff

Regulation 9 – Management and recruitment

(2) A registered provider shall ensure that each employee, unpaid worker and contractor is suitable and competent taking into consideration the nature of the needs of children, including by-

- (a) consideration of references from the person's past employers, if any, and in particular the most recent employer, if any,*
- (b) consideration of references from reputable sources in the case of a person who has no past employers,*
- (c) consideration of the vetting disclosure received from the National Vetting Bureau of the Garda Síochána in accordance with the Act of 2012 in respect of the person, and*
- (d) ensuring, insofar as is practicable, that where a person has lived in a state other than the State for a period of longer than 6 consecutive months, he or she provides police vetting from the police authorities in that state.*

(4) A registered provider shall ensure that, without prejudice to the generality of paragraph (2) and subject to paragraphs (5) and (6), each employee working directly with children attending the service holds at least a major award in Early Childhood Care and Education at Level 5 on the National Qualifications Framework or a qualification deemed by the Minister to be equivalent.

Compliance Information

Fourteen staff records were reviewed.

- (a)(b) Two written and verified past employer references or references from a reputable source in the absence of a past employer reference were available in respect of thirteen adults employed in the service and one student on work placement whose records were reviewed.
- (c) Garda Vetting disclosures were available for thirteen employed staff members. The service also demonstrated compliance with the Early Years Inspectorate Regulatory Notice requiring services to renew Garda vetting every three years.
- (d) International police vetting was available for one adult who had lived in a state other than the State for a period of longer than six consecutive months.
- (4) Twelve adults employed and working directly with children attending the service held at least a major award in Early Childhood Care and Education at Level 5 or higher on the National Framework of Qualifications.

Part III – Management and Staff

Regulation 11 - Staffing levels

- (1) Subject to this Regulation, a registered provider shall ensure that there is at all times an adequate number of adults working directly with the children attending the pre-school service.*
- (2) Subject to paragraphs (4) and (5), a registered provider of a full day care service or a part-time day care service shall ensure that at all times the minimum ratio of adults to children specified in column (3) of Part 1 of Schedule 6 opposite a particular reference number specified in column (1) of that Part in respect of the age range of the children specified in column (2) thereof at that reference number is satisfied.*

Compliance Information

- (1) There were forty-nine pre-school children attending the service being supervised directly by ten adults.
- (2) The minimum ratio of adults to children was adhered to during the day as specified in column (3) of Part 1 of Schedule 6.

Part IV – Information and Records

Regulation 18 – Copy of Act etc.

A registered provider shall ensure that a copy of Part VIIA (inserted by section 92 of the Child and Family Agency Act 2013 (No. 40 of 2013)) of the Act and of these Regulations is kept on the premises and the said copies shall be open to inspection on the premises by-

(c) an authorised person.

Compliance Information

(c) The registered provider ensured that a copy of the regulations was available in the service and was open to inspection on the premises when requested by an authorised person.

Part VI - Safety

Regulation 23 - Safeguarding health, safety and welfare of child

A registered provider shall ensure that all reasonable measures are taken to safeguard the health, safety and welfare of a pre-school child attending the service and that the environment of the service is safe.

Compliance Information

General Safety:

The entrance door to the service was controlled by staff to prevent children from exiting the service unsupervised and to restrict unauthorised persons from gaining access to the pre-school room. The person in charge documented the inspectors visit to the service in the visitor's book on arrival.

Written indoor and outdoor environmental risk assessments were completed daily and maintained to ensure a safe play and work environment for the children and staff. Medication was stored in locked medicine cupboards in each care room and were inaccessible to the children. The service met the necessary safety requirements in respect of the safe storage of cleaning agents.

The staff members were aware of the foods that may pose a choking risk to a child. They also stated that they would remove any necklace/beads if observed that a child may be wearing on arrival to the service.

The children were safely supervised and escorted on the stairs by three adults.

Infection Control:

Thermostatically controlled hot water, liquid hand soap and paper towels in paper dispensers were readily available for hygienic hand washing and drying. The children's hand washing practices were well established and supervised by a staff member.

Foot pedal operated bins were in place for the hygienic disposal of used paper towels and other waste materials. Nappy change facilities were available in the service. A nappy changing step by step procedure was displayed in the sanitary area to support nappy changing practices. Cleaning schedules were available to evidence daily cleaning. The service was maintained in a clean and hygienic condition.

Administration of Medication:

The staff members were aware of the administration of medication policy and the safe practices to follow when administering medication. Medication was not given at the time of the inspection. Written parental consent was available should medication be required to be administered to a child.

There were individual care plans in place for children who required medication to be administered in an emergency situation or on an as required basis during the child's time in the service if it was required.

Safe Sleep:

A comfortable rest area was available in each care room to any child who wished to have a rest or take a break from activities for a while.

It was observed that 10-minute sleep check observations were completed on all sleeping children and the staff documented the colour, position and breathing of sleeping children in their care. The staff members were familiar with current best practice guidelines in relation to reducing the risk of sudden infant death syndrome. Low level sleep beds were available for all children aged over 2 years requiring sleep.

Fire Safety:

Fire drills were carried out monthly and written records were maintained. The staff members were familiar with the fire safety evacuation procedures from the service in the event of a fire or other emergency. Fire exits were not obstructed. Appropriate fire signage was in place in the service and assembly signage was in place outside the service.

Outing:

The service does not conduct outings. This was confirmed by the manager of the service.

Part VI - Safety

Regulation 24 - Checking in and out and record of attendance

- (1) A registered provider shall ensure that each pre-school child attending the service is checked in and out of the service by an employee or an unpaid worker.
- (2) Where there are more than 15 children attending a pre-school service in a drop-in centre, the registered provider shall ensure that one employee or unpaid worker is assigned responsibility for the checking in and out of children.
- (3) A registered provider shall ensure that-
- (a) no person other than-
 - (i) pre-school child attending the service,
 - (ii) a person dropping or collecting such a child,
 - (iii) an employee, or
 - (iv) an unpaid worker, can enter the premises without his or her entry being approved by an employee, and
 - (b) a daily record in writing is kept of the entry on the premises of any such person.
- (4) A registered provider shall ensure that a record in writing referred to in paragraph (3)(b) is retained for a period of one year from the date to which it relates.

Compliance Information

- (1) The registered provider ensured that each child was checked in and out of the service. This was confirmed by the documented attendance records maintained in the pre-school room.
- (2) Not applicable, as this was not a drop-in service.
- (3)(a)(b) The person in charge ensured that any person entering the service was approved and a record in writing was maintained.
- (4) The person in charge confirmed that the records were retained in storage for the required period of time.

Part VI - Safety

Regulation 25 - First aid

- (1) A registered provider shall ensure that a person trained in first aid for children is, at all times, immediately available to the children attending the pre-school service.*
- (2) A registered provider shall ensure that a suitably equipped first aid box for children-*
- (a) is safely stored in an easily accessible and conspicuous position on the premises, and*
 - (b) is available to the children attending the pre-school service at all times.*

Compliance Information

- (1) Persons were trained in in First Aid Response (FAR) for children and were immediately available to the children attending the service.
- (2)
- (a) The first aid equipment was safely stored, in a conspicuous position in the care room.
 - (b) A suitably equipped first aid box for children was available in each care room for the children attending the service.
