The Tusla Early Years Inspectorate carries out inspections of Early Years Services under Section 58(J) of the Child Care Act 1991 (as inserted by Section 92 of the Child and Family Agency Act 2013).

Description of service

Shooting Stars Pre-School is a sessional service operational since 2012 in the rural towns land of Irey, Ballyfin, Co. Laois. The age range of children attending is from 2 years 8 months to 5 years. Two sessional services operate from 9a.m. to 12 noon and from 12.15pm to 3.30pm, Monday to Friday. The service is privately owned and operated by the registered provider. This early years' service is attached to the owners domestic dwelling. The service consists of one large play room, a hallway and cloakroom, two sanitary accommodations and wash hand basins. An enclosed outdoor play area is located to the back of the setting. The grounds of the registered providers domestic dwelling and the service are secured behind an electric gate.

Staffing

The registered provider was on site during the inspection and facilitated the inspection. One staff member was working in the service in addition to the registered provider. All staff members hold a major award in Early Childhood Care and Education at Levels 5 to 6 on the National Framework of Qualifications

Methodology

Tusla's Early Years Inspectorate is the independent statutory regulator of early years services in Ireland. The Child Care Act 1991 (Early Years Services) Regulations 2016 define the duty of a registered provider to ensure the safety and well-being of children and to comply with these regulations. This Act also gives Tusla the authority to assess compliance with the regulations. The purpose of regulation in relation to early years services is to ensure that the care, safety, and well-being of children attending such services is upheld. Inspections of early years services are planned based on the following:

- Previous inspection history
- Any information received in relation to the service

The findings on inspection are based on:

- Information obtained through examination of documentation
- Direct observation

- Discussion with relevant staff. This inspection was unannounced and focused on the area of governance health, welfare and development of child safety premises and facilities. The inspection may also focus on other areas as required.

Inspection findings are documented in the inspection report which is first issued in draft format to the service with an opportunity to respond to any findings. Where statutory requirements are identified as not being met, the registered provider must demonstrate how they have rectified the non-compliance and will prevent any non-compliance from re occurring.

The Corrective Action and Preventive Action plan (CAPA) will be used to inform decisions about compliance with regulatory requirements. Where the registered provider fails to meet the statutory requirements an escalation process may be commenced.

The inspectorate reserves the right to edit responses received for reasons including clarity, completeness, and compliance with administrative and legal processes.

The contents of the report are compiled by the inspectorate body.

Part III – Management and Staff

Regulation 9 – Management and recruitment

(1) A registered provider shall ensure that-

- (a) the service has a designated person in charge and a named person who is able to deputise as required,*
- (b) at all times during the period when the pre-school service is being carried on, the designated person in charge or the named person referred to in subparagraph (a) is on the premises, and*
- (c) there is a clear management structure in the service that identifies the lines of authority and accountability in the service and the specific roles and responsibilities of each employee and unpaid worker.*

(2) A registered provider shall ensure that each employee, unpaid worker, and contractor is suitable and competent taking into consideration the nature of the needs of children, including by-

- (a) consideration of references from the person's past employers, if any, and in particular the most recent employer, if any,*
- (b) consideration of references from reputable sources in the case of a person who has no past employers,*
- (c) consideration of the vetting disclosure received from the National Vetting Bureau of the Garda Síochána in accordance with the Act of 2012 in respect of the person, and*
- (d) ensuring, insofar as is practicable, that where a person has lived in a state other than the State for a period of longer than 6 consecutive months, he or she provides police vetting from the police authorities in that state.*

(3) The procedures specified in paragraph (2) shall be carried out prior to any person being appointed, assigned, or allowed access to or contact with a child attending the pre-school service.

(4) A registered provider shall ensure that, without prejudice to the generality of paragraph (2) and subject to paragraphs (5) and (6), each employee working directly with children attending the service holds at least a major award in Early childhood Care and Education at Level 5 on the National Qualifications Framework or a qualification deemed by the Minister to be equivalent.

(6) Paragraph (4) shall not apply before 1 September 2021 to a person who-

(a) has signed a declaration on or before 30 June 2016 to the effect that he or she intends to retire from employment in a pre-school service before 1 September 2021, and

(b) is in possession of a letter from the Minister confirming that paragraph (4) shall not apply to him or her before that date.

(6A) is inserted by S.I. No.632 of 2016 CHILD CARE ACT 1991 (EARLY YEARS SERVICES) (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS 2016 which states; Regulation 9 of the Child Care Act 1991 (Early Years Services) Regulations (S.I. No. 221 of 2016) is amended - in paragraph (4), by the substitution of "paragraphs (5), (6) and (6A)" for "paragraphs (5) and (6)", and (b) by the insertion of the following paragraph after paragraph (6): "

(6A) Paragraph (4) shall not apply to an employee of a registered provider where - (a) the registered provider receives funding for the employment of the employee pursuant to a scheme funded by the Minister and known as the Access and Inclusion Model, and (b) the employment of the employee is for the purpose of providing support,

pursuant to the scheme referred to in subparagraph (a), for a child attending the service to enable the child to participate in the programme known as the Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) funding Programme.”

- (a) The service has a designated person in charge and a named person who is able to deputise as required.
- (b) The registered provider was present during the inspection and facilitated the inspection. The roster showed that at all times the person in charge or registered provider were present during the opening hours of the service.

- Two staff files were reviewed on site on the day of inspection.
- (a) (b) Validated references from staff members past employers, in particular the most recent employer was available for review. Validated references from reputable sources were available for review.
- (c) Garda vetting disclosures had been obtained for all staff. The service also demonstrated compliance with the Early Years Inspectorate Regulatory Notice requiring services to renew Garda vetting every three years.
- (d) Police vetting from other police authorities was not required .

- Required vetting had been carried out prior to adults being appointed, assigned, or allowed access to or contact with a child attending the pre-school service.

- Staff held a major award in Early Childhood Care and Education at Level 5 to 6 on the National Framework of Qualifications .
- (6)
- (a)(b)
- Not applicable as no employee had signed a declaration on or before June 30, 2016, to the effect that they intended to retire from employment in a pre-school service.
- (6A)
- One employee was working with children under the Access and Inclusion Model (AIM) scheme.

Part III – Management and Staff

Regulation 11 - Staffing levels

(1) Subject to this Regulation, a registered provider shall ensure that there is at all times an adequate number of adults working directly with the children attending the pre-school service.

(3) Subject to paragraph (5), a registered provider of a sessional pre-school service shall ensure that at all times the minimum ratio of adults to children specified in column (3) of Part 2 of Schedule 6 opposite a particular reference number specified in column (1) of that Part in respect of the age range of the children specified in column (2) therefore at that reference number is satisfied.

(8) Without prejudice to paragraphs (2) to (7)-

(c) a registered provider of a sessional pre-school service shall ensure that, where the person in charge operates the service single-handedly, a second person familiar with the operation of the service and in a position to provide assistance to the person in charge in operating the service is, at all times, within close distance of the service and available to attend the service to assist the person in charge in the event of an emergency.

The required ratio of adults to children was maintained during the inspection.

(3)

The registered provider ensured that there were sufficient adults working directly with the children. Records showed that the adult child ratio was upheld in the service.

This service is not operated the service single-handedly

Part IV – Information and Records

Regulation 18 – Copy of Act etc.

A registered provider shall ensure that a copy of Part VIIA (inserted by section 92 of the Child and Family Agency Act 2013 (No. 40 of 2013)) of the Act and of these Regulations is kept on the premises and the said copies shall be open to inspection on the premises by-

- (a) a parent or guardian of a child attending or proposing to attend the service,*
- (b) an employee, unpaid worker, or contractor, and*
- (c) an authorised person.*

Compliance Information

The registered providers had ensured that a copy of Part VIIA (inserted by section 92 of the Child and Family Agency Act 2013 (No. 40 of 2013)) of the Act and of these Regulations was available on the premises and could be viewed by

- (a) a parent or guardian of a child attending or proposing to attend the service,
- (b) an employee, unpaid worker, or contractor, and
- (c) an authorised person

Part V - Care of Child in Pre-school Service

Regulation 19 - Health, welfare, and development of child

(1) A registered provider shall, in providing a pre-school service, ensure that-

(a) each child's learning, development and well-being is facilitated within the daily life of the pre-school service through the provision of the appropriate activities, interaction, materials, and equipment, having regard to the age and stage of development of the child, and

Compliance Information

Basic Needs

Children brought in their own lunch time snacks from home in line with the healthy eating policy of the service.

Lunch time was an interactive experience and children chatted together and were all allowed enough time to eat their food at their own pace.

Children had freedom of movement within the playroom, and it was observed that children had choice of activities, some were resting in the rest area looking at books together in pairs, and singularly while some were involved in table top activities. Children were offered choice when they wanted to go outdoors to play in the outdoor play facility and they agreed to have their lunch first. Some children remarked that they had enjoyed the outdoor picnic yesterday in the outdoor area.

Supporting Relationships

The registered provider encourages family involvement and parents could meet staff on a one-to-one basis to discuss their children's progress and updates were given at hand over time. The children who were leaving the setting and transitioning to primary school celebrated this with a graduation event at end of term. Children who were joining could visit the setting in preparation for their transitioning from home to preschool.

There was a relaxed atmosphere in the setting and the children appeared comfortable in the company of the staff who were familiar with the children's and their families.

Part VI - Safety

Regulation 23 - Safeguarding health, safety, and welfare of child

A registered provider shall ensure that all reasonable measures are taken to safeguard the health, safety and welfare of a pre-school child attending the service and that the environment of the service is safe.

Compliance Information

General Safety:

A secure gate was in place at entrance, located at the front of the premises. Entry to the setting was gained by a door to the side of the building which was operated on a controlled entry system from within. Access to the registered providers domestic dwelling was restricted.

Cleaning, sanitising products and equipment were stored out of reach of children.

Refuge bins were stored away from the play area and out of reach of children.

Infection Control:

The setting was well ventilated by openable windows.

Staff and children were observed washing hands correctly during the inspection and adults were observed reminding children if they forgot and offering assistance if necessary.

The service observed to clean, and well maintained.

Fire Safety:

The fire exit was unobstructed.

The fire exit was fitted with exit display signage.

A notice of the fire assembly point was on display to show fire assembly point outside the building.

Outing:

The registered provider stated that no outing was conducted from the service.

Part VI - Safety

Regulation 25 - First aid

(1) A registered provider shall ensure that a person trained in first aid for children is, at all times, immediately available to the children attending the pre-school service.

(2) A registered provider shall ensure that a suitably equipped first aid box for children-

(a) is safely stored in an easily accessible and conspicuous position on the premises, and

(b) is available to the children attending the pre-school service at all times.

Compliance Information

- (1)
Staff had up to date First Aid Responder (FAR) certification and were available to the children attending the pre-school service.
- (2)(a) The first aid box was safely stored in an easily accessible location on the premises.
- (b) The first aid box was readily available in the service at all times.

Part VI - Safety

Regulation 28 - Insurance

A registered provider shall ensure that the pre-school service is adequately insured.

Compliance Information

A copy of up-to-date insurance cover for the number of children attending the service was available. The insurance cover was valid until March 2025.

Part IX - Inspection and Enforcement

Regulation 33 – Furnishing of information to agency

A registered provider shall furnish the Agency with such information as the Agency may reasonably require for the purpose of enforcing and executing these Regulations and the information shall be in such form, if any, as may be specified by the Agency.

Compliance Information

The registered provider facilitated the inspection and provided access to information as was required for completion of the inspection.
