Description of service

Tot'ng up Playschool is a privately operated early years service located in the village of Castlebridge. It offers a play-based programme to children aged 2 to 6 years of age. The service operates from 9.30am to 12.30pm and can accommodate 20 children. The service is located to the side of the registered provider's home. It consists of three interconnected playrooms, entrance hall and sanitary accommodation. An outdoor garden and play area were available to the rear of the property.

Staffing

There were three staff on the premises on the day of inspection. All three were working directly with the children. The registered provider was on the premises on the day of inspection and works directly with the children. All staff held the minimum of level 5 and above on the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ).

Methodology

Tusla's Early Years Inspectorate is the independent statutory regulator of early years services in Ireland. The Child Care Act 1991 (Early Years Services) Regulations 2016 define the duty of a registered provider to ensure the safety and well-being of children and to comply with these regulations. This Act also gives Tusla the authority to assess compliance with the regulations. The purpose of regulation in relation to early years services is to ensure that the care, safety, and well-being of children attending such services is upheld. Inspections of early years services are planned based on the following:

- Previous inspection history
- Any information received in relation to the service

The findings on inspection are based on:

- Information obtained through examination of documentation
- Direct observation
- Discussion with relevant staff

This inspection was unannounced and focused on the area of governance/ health, welfare and development of child/ safety/ premises and facilities. The inspections may also focus on other areas as required.

The inspection focused on an examination of compliance under the following regulations. These findings are outlined within the relevant regulation within this report.

Regulation 9 Management and Recruitment (1) (2) (a) (b) (c) (d) (4),

Regulation 11 Staffing levels (1) (2),

Regulation 19 Health, Welfare, and Development of the Child (1) (a),

Regulation 23 Safeguarding Health, Safety, and Welfare of the Child,

Regulation 25 First aid (1) (2) (a) (b), and Regulation 28 Insurance.

Inspection findings are documented in the inspection report which is first issued in draft format to the service with an opportunity to respond to any findings. Where statutory requirements are identified as not being met, the registered provider must demonstrate how they have rectified the non-compliance and will prevent any non-compliance from re occurring. The Corrective Action and Preventive Action plan (CAPA) will be used to inform decisions about compliance with regulatory requirements. Where the registered provider fails to meet the statutory requirements an escalation process may be commenced.

The inspectorate reserves the right to edit responses received for reasons including clarity, completeness and compliance with administrative and legal processes.

Part III – Management and Staff

Regulation 9 – Management and recruitment

(1) A registered provider shall ensure that-

- (a) the service has a designated person in charge and a named person who is able to deputise as required,
- (b) at all times during the period when the pre-school service is being carried on, the designated person in charge or the named person referred to in subparagraph (a) is on the premises, and

(2) A registered provider shall ensure that each employee, unpaid worker and contractor is suitable and competent taking into consideration the nature of the needs of children, including by-

- (a) consideration of references from the person's past employers, if any, and in particular the most recent employer, if any,
- (b) consideration of references from reputable sources in the case of a person who has no past employers,
- (c) consideration of the vetting disclosure received from the National Vetting Bureau of the Garda Síochána in accordance with the Act of 2012 in respect of the person, and
- (d) ensuring, insofar as is practicable, that where a person has lived in a state other than the State for a period of longer than 6 consecutive months, he or she provides police vetting from the police authorities in that state.

(4) A registered provider shall ensure that, without prejudice to the generality of paragraph (2) and subject to paragraphs (5) and (6), each employee working directly with children attending the service holds at least a major award in Early childhood Care and Education at Level 5 on the National Qualifications Framework or a qualification deemed by the Minister to be equivalent.

There was a designated person in charge on the premises at all times.

(2) The staff files for all three staff members were reviewed.

(a)(b)

Validated references for all staff were kept in each individual's file.

(c)

Garda vetting disclosures were available for all staff working in the service.

(d)

Police vetting was not required as no staff had lived outside the state for more than six consecutive months.

(4)

Certificates of qualification for all staff members working directly with the children were available on file.

Part III – Management and Staff

Regulation 11 - Staffing levels

(1) Subject to this Regulation, a registered provider shall ensure that there is at all times an adequate number of adults working directly with the children attending the pre-school service.

(2) Subject to paragraphs (4) and (5), a registered provider of a full day care service or a part-time day care service shall ensure that at all times the minimum ratio of adults to children specified in column (3) of Part 1 of Schedule 6 opposite a particular reference number specified in column (1) of that Part in respect of the age range of the children specified in column (2) thereof at that reference number is satisfied.

Throughout the period of the inspection there were adequate numbers of staff working directly with the children attending the service.

(2)

During the morning there were 19 children being directly cared for by 3 staff, ensuring there were adequate staff available to work with the children and to maintain staff/child ratios at all times.

Part V - Care of Child in Pre-school Service

Regulation 19 - Health, welfare and development of child

(1) A registered provider shall, in providing a pre-school service, ensure that-

(a) each child's learning, development and well-being is facilitated within the daily life of the pre-school service through the provision of the appropriate activities, interaction, materials and equipment, having regard to the age and stage of development of the child, and

Compliance Information

(1)(a) The following observations and discussions with staff reflected the children's experience within the service focusing on the children's learning, development and well-being on the day of inspection:

The service consisted of three interconnected playrooms. Each of the rooms were warm, bright and had adequate space to play. Each room was set up and resourced with different interest areas. Children could move freely between the rooms. The interest areas were well developed and thought out which allowed the children to initiate, explore and develop their own imaginative play and learning experiences. The service embraces the outdoor play pedagogy. The outdoor play area was well thought out and developed to allow children opportunities to initiate and fully engage in a variety of interest areas and natural opened ended materials.

Staff and children were observed interacting individually and in small group activities throughout the morning. The children enjoyed water and sand play, dress up, role play in the shop, using playdough, cutting and gluing and reading books. Staff interactions were kind and calm during the morning. Staff were observed to pick up cues from a child who was out of sorts and offered a cuddle. Minor disputes were handled with skill and respect, with staff down at the children's level encouraging the children to use their words to dissolve disputes over sharing toys and offering alternative toys.

The staff offered children the choice of when they wished to have their snacks and the children ate their lunches in two small settings during the morning. Children washed their hands and took out the bags independently and were given help with opening lunch boxes and drinks as needed.

Part VI - Safety

Regulation 23 - Safeguarding health, safety and welfare of child

A registered provider shall ensure that all reasonable measures are taken to safeguard the health, safety and welfare of a pre-school child attending the service and that the environment of the service is safe.

Compliance Information

General Safety:

The entrance to the service and outdoor play area were secured at all times to prevent children exiting unsupervised and to restrict unauthorised persons gaining access. Storage facilities were inaccessible to the children and all cleaning agents, cleaning equipment and liquid hand soap were securely out of reach.

Infection Control:

There was warm running water, liquid soap and paper hand towels available for hand hygiene throughout the service. Regular handwashing was observed throughout the day. The service was clean and well maintained, with cleaning schedules signed daily.

Part VI - Safety

Regulation 25 - First aid

(1) A registered provider shall ensure that a person trained in first aid for children is, at all times, immediately available to the children attending the pre-school service.

(2) A registered provider shall ensure that a suitably equipped first aid box for children-

(a) is safely stored in an easily accessible and conspicuous position on the premises, and

(b) is available to the children attending the pre-school service at all times.

Compliance Information

- (1)
There were staff trained in first aid for children available to the children attending the early years service.
- (2)(a)(b)
There was a suitably equipped first aid box stored in an easily accessible and conspicuous position in the premises and was available for use.

Part VI - Safety

Regulation 28 - Insurance

A registered provider shall ensure that the pre-school service is adequately insured.

Compliance Information

An insurance certificate was available to demonstrate that insurance was in place.
